Dear Village Administrator Schumacher,

On behalf of the Bartlett Police Department, I am humbled and honored to present you with our *2022 Annual Report*. The information contained within this report reflects our police department's mission and vision to "Serve with Care, Protect with Confidence" through our continued efforts to foster community partnerships, improve traffic safety, prevent and reduce criminal activity, and promote our employees' professional development.

Throughout the year, our police department connected and engaged with the Bartlett community. The National Association of Town Watch (NATW) awarded the Village of Bartlett first place in its population category for its 2022 National Night Out celebration. This was the first time the village received back-to-back first place awards since participating in National Night Out 29 years ago.

Our police department continued to focus on DUI enforcement and other dangerous driving behaviors resulting in 7,192 traffic stops, 106 DUI arrests, and 561 aggravated speeding arrests (driving at least 26 mph or more over the posted speed limit). As a result of our efforts, the police department was presented with the 2021-22 Illinois Traffic Safety Challenge second place award in the municipal police category with 51-65 officers.

Last year, our police department was dispatched to 13,830 9-1-1 calls for service and initiated 17,786 calls for service. In 2022, the Part I and II crime rate was 3.2, which is almost a 16% decrease from 2021 (3.8).

In 2022, sworn and non-sworn police officers participated in 14,203 hours of training. The police department and fire protection district's joint rescue task force training was given an honorable mention for IRMA's Innovative Risk Management Award, which recognizes members that exhibit a commitment to the safety of their employees, facilities, and public. Also our police department was only one of a few Illinois police departments to train its officers in ICAT (Integrating Communications, Assessment, and Tactics) de-escalation training developed by the Police Executive Research Forum. This research-proven training is designed to provide our police officers with the tools, skills, and options they need to successfully and safely defuse situations involving persons who are unarmed or are armed with weapons other than firearms, and who may be experiencing a mental health or other crisis.

We are honored to be able to protect, serve, and provide police services to our community. We sincerely appreciate the support we receive from you, the Village Board, and our residents. I continue to be extremely proud of my staff who embrace doing things the "Bartlett Way" to provide exceptional police service to the Village of Bartlett.





Chief Geoffrey Pretkelis

Chief of Police Geoffrey T. Pretkelis was hired as a police officer by the Bartlett Police Department in November 1996. He was promoted to the rank of Sergeant in 2006, appointed to the rank of Commander in 2016, and then to the rank of Deputy Chief of Support Services in 2017. He was appointed as Chief of Police in August 2022. During his career, he has served as a patrol officer, traffic unit officer, school resource officer, and the Public Services Bureau sergeant.

Chief Pretkelis graduated from the FBI National Academy, Northwestern University Center for Public Safety's School of Police Staff and Command, and Police Executive Research Forum's Senior Management Institute for Police. He earned his bachelor's degree in law enforcement and justice administration and also earned his master's degree in business administration from Judson University. He was also awarded the police department's Police Officer of the Year and Leadership Award on two occasions.

Chief Patrick Ullrich

Patrick Ullrich retired on August 5, 2022, after more than 25 years of service with the Bartlett Police Department. Patrick began his career with the department as a Community Service Officer in 1994 and served in that position until 1995. Patrick then served as a Police Officer with the Bloomingdale Police Department from 1995 until 1998. In 1998, Patrick returned to the Bartlett Police Department as a Police Officer where he served until his retirement as Chief of Police in 2022. Patrick was promoted to the rank of Police Sergeant in 2004, was appointed to the rank of Commander in 2006 and Deputy Chief in 2009, and was then appointed Chief of Police in 2017. Patrick holds a Bachelor's Degree, a Master's Degree, was a graduate of the 233rd session of Northwestern University's Center for Public Safety Staff and Command program and a graduate of the 50th session of the Police

Executive Research Forum's Senior Management Institute for Police. Throughout his career, Patrick served in such capacities as Juvenile Officer, Truck Enforcement Officer, Crime Prevention Officer, D.A.R.E. Instructor, and Emergency Vehicle Operator Course Instructor. He was also a member of the DuPage County Chiefs of Police Association's Executive Board and a Team Commander on the DuPage County Police Incident Management Assistance Team. During his five-year tenure as Chief of Police, Patrick not only brought innovations and advancements to the police department's physical space and technology but also enhancements and improvements to the well-being of officers, police staff and the Bartlett community. He oversaw construction of the brand new, state-of the art 48,982 square foot police facility and the implementation of the STARCOM21 interoperable radio communication system. He introduced the part-time social worker program, the police department's facility dog, and PERF's Integrating Communications, Assessment, and Tactics (ICAT) training for defusing critical incidents. He also was instrumental in the adoption of the Ten Shared Principles designed to build trust between law enforcement and communities of color.

Officer Christopher Meade

Christopher Meade celebrated his retirement from the Bartlett Police Department on October 28, 2022 after 20 years of dedicated service. Christopher was hired in 2003 and served in many different capacities for the police department including Patrol Officer, Directed Patrol Team Officer, Detective, Crisis Intervention Team Member, Juvenile Officer, Computer Crimes Officer, Gang Specialist, Officer-in-Charge, and Field Training Officer. Christopher was a valued member of several multi-jurisdictional task forces including Cook County's Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force, Secret Service Cyber Crimes Task Force, DuPage County's Metropolitan Emergency Response and Investigations Team, Cook County's Major Case Assistance Team (MCAT). He was appointed to the position of Deputy Director of MCAT in 2015. His steadfast dedication to serving the most vulnerable

in our population led to over 600 years in total sentenced prison times relating to child pornography and child exploitation cases. Christopher earned many accolades and awards during his career which include the following: a Certificate of Commendation, a Chicago Police Department Joint Operations Award, Unit Citations, Employee of the Month nominations and awards, and two Meritorious Service Awards.



Community Service Officer John Teevans

John Teevans retired on October 27, 2022, after more than 8 years of service with the Bartlett Police Department. John was hired as a Bartlett Community Service Officer in 2014 following his retirement from the Wheeling Police Department as a Deputy Chief where he served in various capacities for more than 28 years. John holds a Bachelor's Degree from the University of Illinois at Chicago, is a graduate of Northwestern University's Center for Public Safety Staff and Command program, and a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's National Academy. John served in many different capacities within the police department, to include Certified Child Safety Seat Technician, Community Service Officer Field Training Officer, Round Table Team member, and Emergency Management Team member. During his tenure with the department, John received an Employee of the Month Award, two Civilian Employee of the Year Awards, and three Unit Citations.




Sergeant Mireya Flores


Officer Nicholas Bos

As a member of the Northern Illinois Police Alarm System's Mobile Field Force, Officer Blaser was often assigned to provide crowd control assistance throughout northern Illinois. His advanced trainings and experience were often taught to Bartlett personnel and are instrumental to the department. During the past year, Officer Blaser was involved in several in-depth investigations and utilized his communication skills to de-escalate intense scenarios. In

October, Officer Blaser received a narcotic tip which led to the seizure of approximately one pound of marijuana and felony charges for two individuals. On another occasion, Officer Blaser uncovered several fraudulent registrations being placed on vehicles and provided valuable information to the proper jurisdiction to assist in its investigation.



Operations Division

The Operations Division is the largest and the most publicly visible component of the police department. Within the Operations Division are the Patrol Section, Community Service Section, and the Directed Patrol Team, which is comprised of Directed Patrol Officers, the Canine Unit, and the Traffic Unit. As its primary function, the Operations Division responds to emergencies and calls for service. Other day-to-day responsibilities include investigating complaints and criminal matters, enforcement of laws and local ordinance, neighborhood and business patrols, traffic safety campaigns and enforcement.

The Operations division also seeks to build community trust and relationships through positive daily interactions with the community, high visibility in residential neighborhoods, and through social media.

Patrol Section

The Patrol Section has many responsibilities and are often considered the first-line of defense when responding to calls for service. Officers in the Patrol Section are responsible for monitoring all areas of the village, while providing a safe and secure environment for the community. The Village of Bartlett has a total incorporated area of 15.97 square miles, which includes 8 elementary schools, 1 middle school, 1 high school, several area businesses and over 41,105 residents. When fully staffed, the Patrol Section is made up of 32 sworn officers, 4 sergeants and 2 commanders. Each shift has an assigned Officer in Charge (OIC) who supervises the shift when a sergeant is off duty. Patrol is divided into four different 12-hour shifts that rotate every 56 days. Each shift is comprised of officers with extensive specialized training in several areas such as: Juvenile Officers, Field Training Officers, Elderly Service Officers, Firearms Instructors, Less Lethal Operators, Taser Operators, Evidence Technicians, Breathalyzer Operators and Crisis Intervention Team Negotiators.

Patrol officers truly make every effort to build positive and lasting relationships with community members, not just by responding to their calls for service, but also stopping by local lemonade stands, challenging area teens to a game of basketball or just stopping in at any of the elementary schools or daycare facilities to say hello to the kids. The Patrol Section has prided itself on being a part of the Bartlett community.



Canine Unit

A canine unit is a powerful tool in the prevention of crime and the prevention of acts of terrorism. That is because the canine's primary purpose is that of a locating tool. A canine's olfactory abilities are unmatched, not even by the highest technological odor detection instruments. Trained canines can locate criminal suspects, lost persons, and latent odors of narcotic-contraband, explosives, accelerants, and even human remains. Trained canines can also assist in the apprehension of criminals and de-escalate the need for the use of force in 95% of circumstances.

The Bartlett Police Department has operated a canine unit since 1996, when K9 Bart was installed as Bartlett's first canine. In 2004, K9 Brewster joined the ranks, and K9 Bart retired in 2005. K9 Brewster served the Bartlett community until his retirement in 2014, when K9 Luther became Bartlett's third canine. In 2022, K9 Luther reached a milestone, his 10th birthday. K9 Luther is assigned to the Patrol Section, assigned to the Directed Patrol Team. All three of Bartlett's canines served Bartlett and the surrounding communities as patrol dogs, narcotic-contraband detection dogs, and human remains detection dogs. The Canine Unit is compliant with the statutory requirements of the State of Illinois, as established by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board, as evidenced by requalifying in narcotic detection in October 2022. K9 Luther was re-certified as a patrol dog in November 2022 by the Chicago Police Department. To maintain certification standards and maximum operational efficiency, the Canine Unit conducted more than 221.15 hours of maintenance training, exceeding the minimum police service dog industry standards for maintenance training of 192 hours. In 2022, the Canine Unit trained with the Northern Illinois Police Alarm System (NIPAS) Mobile Field Force, the Chicago Police Department Canine Training Center, and the Cook County Sheriff's K9 Training Center.

The Canine Unit logged 36.1 hours of deployments in 2022, including for handler protection/canine presence, narcotic-contraband detection, tracking, human remains detection, article searches and building searches. In 2022, the Canine Unit sniffed 3,151 student lockers at the Bartlett High School and Eastview Middle School. The Canine Unit deployed to assist the NIPAS Mobile Field Force with three activations. In April 2022, the Canine Unit was responsible for locating a subject wanted for resisting arrest, as well as on an outstanding arrest warrant for domestic battery.

Directed Patrol Team

The Directed Patrol Team (DPT) consists of four dedicated officers: a traffic officer, canine officer, directed patrol officer, and one DEA detached duty officer. The team is supervised by the DPT Sergeant. Essential functions of DPT include coordinating sex offender compliance checks, parolee and massage parlor compliance checks, performing warrant services, engaging in narcotics investigations, and conducting high visibility traffic enforcement. The team works flexible hours to assist in patrol functions as well as supplementing the investigations section, providing additional resources during extensive investigations. The alterable work schedule allows for the team to maintain a proactive approach when addressing crime trends and community concerns. DPT relies on crime and traffic crash data to effectively deploy resources in areas where crime and crashes are most frequently occurring. Additionally, DPT conducts community presentations at businesses, schools, and the citizen police academy.

Community Service Officers

Bartlett Police Department is staffed with four full-time Community Service Officers (CSOs). CSOs work four, 10-hour days weekly, covering a day shift from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. and an evening shift from 12 p.m. to 10 p.m. in the spring and summer months. During the fall and winter months, their evening hours are adjusted to work 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., increasing productivity during times of lower call volume.

Each CSO is assigned his own Ford F-150 patrol vehicle allowing a wider variety of calls and assignments to be handled. Some of the more frequent calls CSOs encounter while on patrol are vehicle lock-outs, all animal complaints, enforcement of village ordinances (e.g. parking violations, open burning, dumping), roadway hazards, traffic direction during various incidents, and investigation of private property crashes. CSOs also perform ink and digital fingerprinting of residents regarding employment and handle investigations of criminal complaints where offenders are unknown, such as theft, criminal damage to property, and juvenile nuisance issues.

Ancillary duties completed by CSOs include, but are not limited to: deploying unmanned police cars, radar speed trailers/speed sign deployment, vacation house checks, filling-in for Records personnel during a staff shortage or meal breaks, acting Court Liaison Officer, and assisting in evidence destruction, prescription drug drop off events, and special events. Our CSOs are often utilized on the Village's social media for public safety announcements or to promote the department during holidays and special occasions.

CSOs play a vital role in the maintenance and viability of department assets, infrastructure and grounds, including the service of all fleet vehicles, our traffic sign board, and light towers. When fleet vehicles, vehicle equipment, and other surplus department property reach their end of useful life CSOs are tasked with selling them through the online Obenauf auction site.

All CSOs are trained as child safety seat technicians and in CPR/AED. Some of our CSOs are certified as Evidence Technicians and Animal Humane Officers.



Traffic Unit

During 2022, the Traffic Unit assisted in the efforts of the Patrol Division in continuing to make Aggravated Speeding violations a priority. 561 Aggravated Speeding arrests were made in 2022 which is a 10.6% increase from 2021. The Traffic Unit performed yearly presentations to the Driver's Education classes at Bartlett High School utilizing "Texting while Driving" simulators provided by AAA as well as presentations for "How to act when being pulled over by the Police." The Traffic Unit organized the department's Distracted Driving and Click It or Ticket campaign, the 5/9 on 59 event, and the Illinois Speed Awareness Day coordinated by Faces4.org. COVID restrictions prevented the yearly event of the Kane County High Visibility Enforcement (HiVE) Distracted Driving campaign. The Bartlett Police Department was awarded 2nd place in the Illinois Traffic Safety Challenge. The Traffic Unit assisted in changing existing Village Ordinances for truck traffic restrictions and to aid in traffic flow around school areas. The Traffic Unit received numerous traffic and speeding complaints throughout the Village. Saturation patrols were conducted weekly to address these areas of concerns. Drone cars and speed trailers were utilized to abate these issues, and all complaints were disseminated to the Patrol Division to assist in monitoring the areas.



DUI Enforcement


During 2022, Bartlett Police officers made a total of 106 DUI arrests. 14 of these arrests were made in the month of July, 14 in September, 13 in June, and 12 in November. 46 arrestees submitted to chemical testing of their breath which resulted in 17 arrestees testing in the .00 to .079 range, one arrestee testing in the .08 to .10 range, 15 arrestees testing in the .101 to .149 range, 6 arrestees testing in the .15 to .20 range, 4 arrestees testing in the .201 to .25 range, one arrestee testing in the .251 to .30 range, and two arrestees testing in the .301 or higher range. 60 arrestees refused to submit to either chemical testing of their breath or of their blood and urine when requested.

2022 Traffic Citations by Race


The illustration below reflects the distribution of citations broken down into the reportable racial categories. The results are reflective of the make up of our community and closely surrounding municipalities.





930 Traffic Crashes Occurred in 2022


2022 TRAFFIC CRASHES BY TYPE - 930 Total



2022 TOP TRAFFIC CRASH LOCATIONS




By Month




Alcohol Related Crashes



By Time of Day






Aggravated Speeding Enforcement

561 total arrests including 516 Class B Aggravated Speeding 26-34 MPH over the limit and 45 Class A Aggravated Speeding 35+ MPH over the limit. Ten of the Class A violations were 45 or more over the speed limit with the average speed of all Class A violations being 40.64 MPH. Maximum speed violation stopped was 105 MPH in a 40 MPH zone, 65 MPH over the limit. The tables below depict the day of the week and the time of day when citations were issued.

2022 Cases of Interest

In 2022, Bartlett Police Department investigated a sexual assault which occurred several years prior and was recently reported. Through several interviews, Detectives learned the allegations included instances of sexual assault and sexual abuse between the offender and the juvenile victims. Detectives conducted several interviews with the offender, potential witnesses, and worked closely with the Cook County Children’s Advocacy Center. Bartlett Police also worked with the Cook County State’s Attorney’s Office for bringing charges against the defendant. The accused was charged with two Class X felonies for Aggravated Criminal Sexual Assault and a Class 2 felony for Aggravated Criminal Sexual Abuse.


In October of 2022, officers initiated a drug investigation involving an individual who was in possession of a large amount of narcotics. Officers identified the offender’s vehicle and obtained a search warrant which yielded a package containing a large amount of cannabis. While conducting the investigation Bartlett Police obtained a search warrant for the residence. In efforts to ensure safety to the public and police officers, Bartlett Police were assisted by the Northern Illinois Police Alarm System to assist in entering the residence. After extensive interviews and evidence collection, two individuals were charged with felonies for Unlawful Possession of Cannabis with Intent to Deliver and felonies for Unlawful Possession of Cannabis.






Support Services

The Support Services Division provides operational support for the police department. It includes Investigations (Detectives), School Resource Officers at Bartlett High School and Eastview Middle School, Crime Prevention/D.A.R.E. Officers, Records Section, School Crossing Guards, Fleet Maintenance, Planning and Research (Accreditation), Parking Enforcement, Police Social Worker, and the Property Custodian/Court Liaison. The Support Services Division is commanded by Deputy Chief Naydenoff and Investigations/Support Services Commander Alagna.

Investigations Section

The Investigations Section is staffed by one Commander, one Detective Sergeant, five Detectives, and one Investigations Secretary. Our detectives work eight-hour days, five days a week, and cover an on-call rotation of Monday through Sunday to support the goals and objectives of the police department twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.


Detectives investigate all types of felony and misdemeanor crimes, locate missing/runaway/endangered persons, and assist patrol officers with complex calls for service. An investigation is most often initiated after a patrol officer refers a case which cannot be completed without significant resources and when additional time is required. The Detective Sergeant reviews each case and assigns it to a Detective based on several solvability factors. Some of these factors include: seriousness of the crime, clear descriptions which could lead to the identification of a suspect and/or vehicle, physical evidence collected, and a pattern of criminal activity or behavior. Once a case is assigned to a Detective, they will begin building and preparing their case to ultimately present it to the appropriate state's attorney's office for successful prosecution.

In 2022, the Investigations Section was assigned 131 new cases to investigate. In the same year, 124 cases were closed, some of which may have been ongoing from the previous year(s). Throughout the year, Detectives continually receive specialized training to improve their skills and knowledge in various fields, including but not limited to, homicide investigations, sexual assault investigations, child abuse investigations, interview/interrogation techniques, juvenile law, and computer crimes. Our Detectives maintain open lines of communication and develop relationships with surrounding police agencies on a regular basis to gather and share information.

One Detective is the department's Computer Crime Investigator and is tasked with investigating crimes that have a digital evidence component. These crimes can be inherently digital in nature, as in a drug investigation that cellular phones have been seized from. Our Computer Crime Investigator investigates online components of high-tech crime, such as deceptive practices and/or fraud, and also performs forensic analysis as needed on seized, surrendered, or recovered computers, cellular phones, digital cameras, etc. Our Computer Crimes Investigator is assigned to the Cook County Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) task force and works in an undercover capacity to identify child predators and individuals disseminating child pornography. During 2022, 58 cases were initiated for child pornography and 10 arrests were made. Our Computer Crimes Investigator was also assigned 30 cybertips from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) during 2022. Our Computer Crimes Investigator also forensically examined 17 cellular phones and 5 computers related to cases assigned to investigations.

The Computer Crimes Investigator also functions to collect, store, assess, and disseminate criminal intelligence information for the legitimate needs of the Bartlett Police Department. Our Computer Crimes Investigator gathers intelligence for the purpose of identifying criminal patterns, trends, identification of suspects and criminal enterprises, and to identify officer safety issues.

The department has one Detective who is an Illinois Certified Arson Investigator, two Detectives are assigned to the Metropolitan Emergency Response and Investigations Team (MERIT) of DuPage County, two Detectives are assigned to the Major Case Assistance Team (MCAT) of Cook County, and one Detective is assigned to the Sexual Assault Response Team (SART3) in Cook County.

Task Force Memberships

Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA)



The Mission of the DEA is to enforce the controlled substances laws and regulations of the United States and prosecute in the criminal and civil justice systems of the United States. Bartlett began a partnership with the DEA in 2012 on a task force back out of the Chicago Field Divisions. We have one officer assigned as a Task Force Officer (TFO). The TFO's duties include: mobile and aerial surveillance, transportation interdiction, working in an undercover capacity in narcotics, and monitoring federal wire taps. The seizure and forfeiture of assets derived from, traceable to, or intended to be used for illicit drug trafficking directly benefits the Bartlett Police Department. In 2022, this DEA task force initiated 64 cases that involved two arrests, seized 1.98 million dollars, seized 40,400 grams of marijuana, seized 107 grams of fentanyl, and seized 1130 grams of cocaine. Bartlett received a percentage of the currency to be used in combating local narcotic problems.

Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS)



ILEAS is a statewide police mutual aid system with over 900-member agencies. Bartlett is a member of Region IV of the ILEAS plan, which incorporates mutual aid responses for towns in Lake, Kane, Cook, and DuPage Counties. In 2022, Bartlett officers did not respond to or request mutual aid.

DuPage County Metropolitan Emergency Response and Investigation Team (MERIT)



The DuPage Metropolitan Emergency Response and Investigation Team (MERIT) has dedicated resources for SWAT responses, crisis negotiations, major crash reconstruction, K-9 response, planned events, major crimes, crime scene investigations, intelligence gathering, computer forensics, and incident management assistance. Bartlett Police Department has one crisis negotiator, one detective and one crash reconstructionist assigned to MERIT. In 2022, the task force responded to 84 requests for service, including 52 crashes, 19 crisis negotiations, and 13 major case investigations. Bartlett requested MERIT services 2 times in 2022.

Cook County Major Case Assistance Team (MCAT)



MCAT is a multi-jurisdictional task force formed in 1998 comprised of police officers serving in the roles of detectives, evidence technicians, and a surveillance team. MCAT is activated when a major incident occurs that could overwhelm an agency, such as homicides, kidnappings, and other major crimes. MCAT officers are specifically selected based on their training, experience, and talents. MCAT officers' tasks include; canvassing neighborhoods, interviewing witnesses and suspects, providing technical support, and collection of evidence. In 2022, Bartlett had one officer assigned as the Deputy Director of MCAT as well as one officer assigned to the evidence team. MCAT was activated six times in 2022 resulting in 2312 investigative hours, 1626 hours of evidence processing and 185.5 hours of physical surveillance. Bartlett did not request MCAT services in 2022.

Secret Service Cyber Fraud Task Force (CFTF)



The US Secret Service Cyber Fraud Task Force (CFTF), formerly the Electronic Crimes Task Force, works to combat cybercrime by increasing the resources and skills available by combining forces with state, local, and federal law enforcement agencies. The Computer Crimes Investigator has been assigned to this task force since 2015 and attends regularly scheduled meetings and trainings.

Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force (ICAC)



Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force is a national network of 63 coordinated task forces representing over 4,500 federal, state and local law enforcement and prosecutorial agencies. These agencies engage in proactive/reactive investigations and prosecutions of persons involved in child abuse and exploitation involving the internet. Bartlett's Computer Crimes Investigator is assigned to the Cook County ICAC Task Force. In 2022, the Bartlett Computer Crimes Investigator initiated 58 cases for child pornography, and 10 arrests were made. The Computer Crimes Investigator was also responsible for analyzing and interpreting 30 cybertips from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC).

Northern Illinois Police Alarm System (NIPAS)



NIPAS is a police mutual aid system operating in Northeastern Illinois. NIPAS was established by an intergovernmental agreement in 1983 and now has 103-member agencies. NIPAS has three main components: Mutual Aid System, Emergency Services Team (EST), and Mobile Field Force (MFF). The Mutual Aid System provides for participating agencies to send police officers to the requesting municipality in the event of a natural disaster or special event. EST is a full-service tactical team designed to handle high-risk incidents. MFF is a unit designed to respond to incidents of civil disturbance and consists of an arrest team, weapons team, extraction team, and command team. In 2022, NIPAS EST responded to 42 requests for service. NIPAS MFF responded to 27 requests for service. Bartlett has one officer on the EST and two officers on the MFF. Bartlett requested NIPAS EST services one time in 2022.

MCAT Serious Traffic Accident Reconstruction (STAR)



The STAR Team is a traffic crash response and reconstruction team. The MCAT STAR team responds to fatal motor vehicle crashes or motor vehicle crashes where death is likely, and multiple vehicles are involved. Bartlett has one officer assigned to the STAR team. In 2022, Bartlett requested the MCAT STAR team for one fatal crash. MCAT STAR team responded to 10 crashes totaling 427.25 hours of investigations.

Records Section

The Bartlett Police Records Sections is here to provide residents with service twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. We are here to assist our community of 41,000 residents from three (3) counties, Cook, DuPage, and Kane, via phones, face to face, and mail. The records section is fully staffed with eight (8) full time clerks, two (2) part time data entry clerks, and one (1) records supervisor who all report directly to the Commander of Support Services. Each records clerk is trained in handling any issues residents have and to provide the best solution.

Our Records Section handles a multitude of tasks for the department and the community. To name a few, we handle records checks, maintain the department's active warrant files for each county, get court jackets ready, assist with overnight parking/vacations watches, approve Calls for Service, monitor our local radios, and transmit tickets to the court houses. We also work closely with our legal, county and state/federal partners. Records also has the following responsibilities:

Local Adjudication and Administrative Tow Hearings

Bartlett officers issued 99 local adjudication citations and 1548 parking citations for the year. Of these citations, a total of 426 were heard by the hearing officer, of which \$9,575 fines were imposed. The hearing officer also dismissed a total of seven citations. Bartlett police also impounded 165 vehicles that qualified for administrative tows after the motorists were arrested for criminal offenses listed in our village ordinances. The village collected \$82,000 in fines.



School Resource Officers

Our School Resource Officers are Officer Ray Garcia at Bartlett High School and Officer Pat Carey at Eastview Middle School. The School Resource Officers are commanded by Sergeant Greg Milos.



Eastview Middle School SRO

Officer Carey's primary goal is to provide a safe learning environment for Eastview's students, staff, and visitors. Officer Carey maintains an "open door" for school concerns, and works with the Eastview community to solve these issues. Officer Carey works on relationship-building between students and the police department as well maintaining a mentoring role, especially with potentially at-risk students

In 2022, Officer Carey taught Project Alert to 355 7th grade students at Eastview Middle School. Project Alert is an in-depth course discussing the consequences of smoking/vaping, alcohol, marijuana, and opioid abuse. Officer Carey also started his third year of teaching a self-created "Internet/Social Media Safety" class. This class focuses on internet-specific laws, avoiding victimization, and the long-term consequences of social media usage. The class is constantly updated and has now been shared with several SROs in the state to help educate their students. Officer Carey also drops in as requested to speak with classes on subjects such as the Bill of Rights, good decision-making, and careers in law enforcement.

Also, in 2022 Officer Carey started the Travis Manion Foundation "Character Matters" club at EVMS. This club was one of the first TMF clubs approved for the middle school-level in the country. The TMF club meets several times a month to discuss ways to improve the school and community, as well as how to build character, and self-development.



Officer Carey was also elected as a Director of the Board for the Illinois School Resource Officer's Association (ILSROA) in 2022. ILSROA represents the state's SROs and works to educate the state's SROs on the best and most current practices being used.

Officer Carey was also the assistant coach for the EVMS Girls' Basketball team's 2nd place finish. Go Wolves!

Bartlett High School SRO

School Resource Officers (SROs) provide a safe and secure building for student learning. The SRO at Bartlett High School, Officer Garcia continues to make positive relationships with the students, staff and employees of District U-46. Officer Garcia attends monthly District U-46 meetings, County and State SRO meetings to share information on school safety with other SRO's throughout DuPage, Kane and Cook counties.

Officer Garcia taught the following classes:

Law Class- 4th and 5th amendment rights.

Drivers Ed- Teen Driving, New Driver hands on training

BHS students are asked to fill out a "Reflection Sheet" on their time here at BHS. One question asked was "Is there a staff member in school that creates a sense of belonging for you?" Several students listed Officer Garcia as their sense of belonging.

In 2022 Officer Garcia became a mentor in Bartlett High Schools "GUIDE RIGHT" and "Brothers Rise Pp" programs. These programs help students prepare for college and life after high school. Officer Garcia continues to serve on the School Safety Advisory Board which gives students a voice on school safety. Go HAWKS!



Support Services / Crime Prevention

Support Services has always prided itself in having a positive working relationship with the community by assisting and educating the residents and businesses through programs such as: Neighborhood Watch, Dog Walker Watch, Business Watch, C.P.T.E.D. (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design), bank robbery awareness training, active shooter/safety presentations at area businesses, and safety talks at area schools, churches, and day care facilities.

Throughout the year, Crime Prevention Officers participated in "Run, Hide, Fight" lockdown drills at all the Bartlett area schools, conducted functionality tests with emergency key fobs for schools, and checked the times alarms were received by dispatch to ensure a quick response.

The Support Services Unit was able to hold Coffee-n-Chats and presentations each month for residents of Victory Centre. We gave an overview of the Bartlett Police Department, talked about Maverick our Facility Dog, discussed scams and cons, as well as had coffee and snacks with the residents to discuss ideas for future presentations.

Our Neighborhood Watch and "Bartlett Paws on Patrol" Dog Walker Watch programs continue to educate citizens about paying attention to and reporting suspicious activities in their neighborhoods, whether they are walking, riding bicycles, or walking the dog. Each of these programs is essential to the safety of our community. In 2022, the Support Services Unit hosted its outdoor Dog Walker Watch summer training session and social event. Several We continue to have amazing participation by our residents, with several newcomers requesting to be added to our email list to receive information about events in town, future training dates, and any reported issues.

D.A.R.E. Program



The D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) Program is a collaborative effort between law enforcement, elementary schools, and parents to help students make healthy choices, say no to drugs, resist peer pressure, and stand up to bullying. In 2022, over 700 fifth graders from seven elementary schools in Bartlett participated in the D.A.R.E. program. There is also a modified curriculum for MLP (Modified Learning Program), ILP (Individual Learning Program) and LD/BD (Learning Disabled and Behavioral Disorder) students who attend one of the four elementary schools offering these types of programs. The D.A.R.E. curriculum included lessons on the dangers of alcohol, tobacco, vaping and marijuana, positive and negative peer pressure, internet safety, confident communication and resistance strategies, risks and consequences, and how to deal with bullying situations.



Emergency Management Agency

The Bartlett Police Department's Emergency Management Team consists of about 15 members that includes a Deputy Chief of Operations, Commander/ Emergency Management Coordinator, Sergeants, Officers, Community Service Officers, Public Works, and Village Administration. Our team assists the Village of Bartlett during large scale events such as the Independence Day Festival and Parade events, National Night Out events, and many other community events. Our team's emergency management efforts include event planning, public education, training, and other preparedness activities.

The Village of Bartlett remains committed to responding to all natural and man-made disasters or active threat situations utilizing trained personnel, equipment, and National Incident Management System (NIMS/ICS) protocols. Our team holds quarterly training meetings and expands our training to encompass various topics in emergency management including planning special community events, developing a Village Comprehensive Emergency Preparedness Plan, and conducting table top exercises, functional exercises, and full-scale exercises. The team also works together to develop emergency plans, large scale training, and works together during real-world emergencies. Although some hazards are less frequent than others, the Emergency Management Team facilitates additional planning and training on hazards with the highest potential including: Severe Weather events, Active Threats, Public Health Emergencies/Pandemics, Winter Weather events, and Transportation Emergencies.

The Village of Bartlett is also a member of the DuPage County Incident Management Assistance Team (IMAT). As agencies are being faced with more complex incidents, the need for well-trained, experienced experts in the field of incident management are becoming more necessary. IMAT will help the Village of Bartlett with the command and control of large-scale events such as an active -shooter situation, protest, and any large-scale incident needing many resources. When requested, IMAT will send sworn officers and supervisors from DuPage County municipalities to assist with the planning and handling of the incident.

Evidence Technician Unit

Our team of forensic specialists or Evidence Technicians (ETs) are a vital link in the successful identification and prosecution of an offender in a criminal court of law. An ET is usually called to a scene to assist a police officer after a crime has been discovered. Our ETs are trained and equipped to handle various crime scenes, from crimes against person and/or property to deaths, both natural and suspicious in nature. Methods of evidence collection include, but are not limited to: digital photography, fingerprint/footprint lifting, fingerprint fuming, impression casting, alternative light source imaging, gunshot residue testing, and DNA recovery. The team is supervised by a sergeant and is made up of 27 ETs, including a Certified Arson Investigator and a Computer Forensic Expert. Our ETs are assigned to different sections throughout the police department and perform evidence processing duties in addition to their regular work assignments. Additionally, some ETs belong to the Major Case Assistance Team (MCAT) for Cook County, Serious Traffic Accident Reconstruction (STAR) Team for Cook County, and the Metropolitan Emergency Response and Investigations Team's (MERIT) Major Crash Reconstruction Team for DuPage County.

During 2022, our ETs processed crime scenes involving death investigations, burglaries to motor vehicles and residences, stolen motor vehicles, armed robberies, firearm cases, personal injury and fatal traffic crashes, and criminal sexual assaults. With a large number of stolen motor vehicles in 2022 we processed multiple recovered vehicles and successfully collected evidence containing DNA and latent fingerprints. Our ETs assisted in the execution of search warrants to locate and recover evidence listed on a particular warrant, which requires several ETs working together to process the scene, document, photograph, recover, and package evidence.

This year a designated team of ETs with advanced training was formed to be primarily used on callouts for major incidents. Additionally, the department increased in-house training to allow senior ETs to share decades of experience to our newer ETs to enhance their skillset. Finally, seven officers were newly certified as ETs by attending the 40-hour Basic Evidence Technician training class.

Property Control Unit

Property Custodian Mark Hogan, supervised by Sergeant Greg Milos, are responsible for the proper storage, control and security of each piece of evidence or property held by the police department. The Property Control Unit has over 1600 square feet of evidence storage, located in the basement of the building. The first floor of the Property Control Unit consists of an evidence processing area along with 24 temporary evidence lockers and 12 refrigerated evidence lockers for evidence that has been submitted into Property Control.

Submitted evidence and property into the Property Control Unit is entered into a computerized database using the BEAST software system. Every piece of inventoried evidence in the database is linked to a specific incident number, with a description of each item along with the name of the police officer who inventoried the item and victim/complainant information pertaining to the case. Each inventoried item is also labeled with a barcode sticker and given a specific storage location in Property Control. Some examples of inventoried items are: cash, guns, jewelry, weapons, drugs, biological samples, latent fingerprints and bicycles.

The Property Custodian is responsible for submitting evidence for testing and analysis in a timely manner to the Illinois State Police Crime Lab and the DuPage County Forensic Science Center.

Evidence and property are destroyed or disposed of pursuant to court orders, expiration of statute of limitations and a six-month time frame on found property. When an owner cannot be found, the property may be auctioned off and found unclaimed bicycles may be auctioned off or donated to a not-for-profit organization that provides jobs for youths fixing up the bicycles.

In 2022, the Property Control Unit received 2,107 items into Evidence / Property Storage, 15 items were transferred to other agencies, 53 items were sent to crime labs for testing, 119 items were returned to owners, 2377 items were destroyed, and 5 items were auctioned. Additionally, 498 lbs. of unwanted medications were dropped off at free public Drug Drop-Off events at the Village Hall and taken to the DuPage County Health Department for incineration.

Field Training Program

The Police Officer Field Training and Evaluation Program is a post-academy 17-week training consisting of intense, formal, standardized, and structured one-on-one training with four different field training officers. The program is designed to provide a new officer with the necessary tools and confidence for solo patrol. In 2022, eight new officers successfully completed the program.

The Sergeant Field Training and Evaluation Program is offered as one-on-one training for newly promoted sergeants to learn through systematic instruction with an experienced sergeant. The goal of this mentoring program is to assist the new sergeant in becoming a fully competent first line supervisor who is capable of performing their duties with confidence and skill. In 2022, one sergeant completed the program.

The Community Service Officer (CSO) Training and Evaluation Program is 10 weeks of one-on-one training with two different field training officers. The program is designed to provide the CSOs with the training to perform their daily duties, as well as familiarize themselves with the other roles they will fulfill within the department. These other roles include court liaison, records clerk, and evidence technician. In 2022, one new CSO completed the program.

School Crossing Guard Program

The School Crossing Guard Program ensures safe passage for students and parents as they walk to and from school. Bartlett Police Department currently has 22 crossing guard posts in the morning and the afternoon on school days. Our crossing guards cover six elementary schools and one middle school within the Village. All crossing guards must attend an annual training session before crossing students at their posts. This training session includes a written exam and a practical outdoor session as part of the requirements. Our crossing guards also receive performance evaluations at their assigned posts twice a school year. During the pandemic, some crossing guard posts had to be modified. Still, regardless of any changes made, it is very evident that these crossing guards are building lasting relationships with the children and parents who walk to and from school each day.



Round Table Team



The Round Table Team was formed in 2011 to discuss matters concerning department policies and procedures, problem solving, and organizational culture. The Round Table Team consists of twelve department members who serve a staggered two-year term and have differing responsibilities and titles. The team works together to make binding decisions as representatives of the entire department.

Recruitment Team

While recruitment efforts for qualified candidates are ongoing, the department's recruitment team conducts formal meetings and recruitment strategies prior to any police officer testing process. In accordance with Illinois state law, the Village of Bartlett conducts written examinations to begin establishing a list of eligible police officer candidates. Any hiring to fill vacant positions within the sworn officer ranks must be done in conjunction with these lists.

The unprecedented COVID-19 pandemic forced our recruitment team, our testing agency, and our Board of Fire and Police Commissioners to create a validated on-line version of our written examination. This process has proved extremely reliable and yielded multiple qualified applicants for hire, specifically during a time where police departments across the area have seen a decrease of interested applicants in our field. After having this success, we continued to proceed in the same manner for our future written examinations.

Since registering our final eligibility lists for entry level and lateral police officers in June of 2022, the Bartlett Police Department again experienced a large number of retirements within our ranks, leading us to exhaust our eligibility lists for the second time since 2020.

The recruitment team began the process of formulating and coordinating another active recruitment campaign to establish a second final eligibility list for entry level and lateral police officers. Our recruitment team and Board of Fire and Police Commissioners registered our second final eligibility lists for entry level and lateral police officers on November 3, 2022.

As 2022 was coming to an end, our recruitment team and Board of Fire and Police Commissioners soon realized our November 3, 2022 final eligibility lists would again be exhausted in January of 2023. As a result, the recruitment team began coordinating a third active recruitment campaign during the Village's same fiscal budget year to establish a another final eligibility list for entry level and lateral police officers.

Our entry level and lateral police officer applications are expected to go live in March of 2023 and the on-line written examination in late April or early May of 2023. Successful candidates with a passing score will be given the opportunity for an oral interview before the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners. Upon the completion of the oral interviews, we are projecting to have our final eligibility lists registered in June of 2023, determined by the combination of scores earned from the written examination and oral interview.

Court Liaison

The primary duties and responsibilities of the Bartlett Police Department's Court Liaison Officer, Mark Hogan ensure an effective and efficient court process. The Court Liaison Officer:

- Assigns police personnel court dates for court appearances in Cook, DuPage, and Kane Counties
- Coordinates and schedules each officer's felony, misdemeanor and local ordinance court calls in each respective court venue
- Retrieves court files and evidence for each court call
- Delivers subpoenaed materials prior to the commencement of the court call
- Transmits citations, bonds and warrants to the Clerk of the Circuit Court
- Maintains professional, positive relationships with judges, state's attorney's offices, court clerks, and attorneys to ensure open communication, effectiveness, and cooperation with the Bartlett Police Department



At court appearances, the Court Liaison Officer:


- Documents officer attendance
- Ensures officers possess appropriate court materials
- Monitors and documents dispositions of each case

In 2022, the Court Liaison attended 49 Cook County misdemeanor, local ordinance, and traffic call court dates. The Court Liaison Officer attended 42 DuPage County misdemeanor, traffic, and local ordinance court calls. Some Cook County traffic and misdemeanor court calls are held via Zoom. Officers mostly testified when needed via Zoom at the Bartlett Police Department, with some exceptions when officers were called to the courthouse for live testimony. The Court Liaison delivered 188 sets of subpoenaed materials to Cook and Kane County court agencies.

9-1-1 Communications

DuPage Public Safety Communications (DU-COMM) is an intergovernmental agency in Wheaton formed in 1975 to provide emergency communication services to police, fire, and emergency medical services. It is one of the largest consolidated public safety communications centers in Illinois and currently serves forty-four agencies and over 850,000 residents in DuPage and neighboring counties. DU-COMM processes over 1.2 million phone calls each year, including over 750,000 police and Fire/EMS incidents.

In 2022, DU-COMM handled 31,616 incidents for the Bartlett Police Department. DU-COMM dispatched 13,830 calls for service and there were 17,786 officer-initiated activities.



Accreditation



The Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA), based in Gainesville, Virginia, awards law enforcement accreditation to agencies that voluntarily submit to this rigorous process. Accreditation recognizes professionalism, distinction, competency, and our ongoing pursuit of excellence. There are 461 CALEA standards in the law enforcement program for which agencies are expected to maintain updated written policies and annual proofs of compliance. Bartlett PD is among 48 police agencies in Illinois and less than 7% of police agencies in the United States which are currently CALEA accredited.

In our continuing updates of the police department policy manual, we revised 34 existing orders and added 3 new ones in 2022. An additional 129 orders were revised to reflect the appointment of the new Chief of Police.

A major provision of the Illinois SAFE-T Act mandated the end of the cash bail system in Illinois in January, 2023. The Department readied updates to 22 policies, conducted training, and prepared forms and procedures in anticipation of this deadline. All of this preparation was placed on hold until the Illinois Supreme Court rules on the law in 2023.

We successfully completed a CALEA web-based review of our standards compliance in November 2022. This is the third of four annual web-based reviews prior to our next site-based review in July 2023.

Department Code of Ethics

POLICE OFFICERS:

As a law enforcement officer, my fundamental duty is to serve the community; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all to liberty, equality and justice. I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty. I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and the relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities. I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice. I know that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence. I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself to my chosen profession...law enforcement.

CIVILIAN EMPLOYEES:

I acknowledge respect for human life, recognizing diversity among the members of the community and department I serve. I will exhibit honesty and integrity through ethical behavior. I will be obedient to the laws of the Village of Bartlett, the State of Illinois and the United States of America. I will not, in the performance of my duty, work for personal advantage or profit. I will, at all times, recognize that I am a public servant, and that ultimately I am responsible to the public. I will give the most efficient, impartial and courteous service of which I am capable at all times. I will regard my fellow employees with the same standards as I maintain for myself. I will accept responsibility for my actions. I will do only those things that will reflect honor on my fellow employees, my supervisors, my agency and myself.



Internal Affairs Report

It is our policy to receive and investigate all complaints related to internal discipline in a manner that will assure the community of prompt corrective action when department members conduct themselves improperly, and to protect the police department and its members from unwarranted criticism pursuant to the discharge of official duties. In 2022, there were no formal complaints against department members. Bartlett Police Department investigated twenty-one (21) informal complaints for violations of departmental rules, policies, or procedures in 2022. Five (5) complaints were initiated by members of the public and sixteen (16) complaints were made internally by the department. Of those cases, seventeen (17) were sustained and resulted in some form of disciplinary or counseling action.

Training

In 2022, employees attended 14,203 hours of training, for sworn and non-sworn personnel. The training provided to department personnel includes many sources, such as: computer-based programs, subject-matter experts, roll call discussion, in-house instruction, Northeast Multi Regional Training (NEMRT), Northwestern University Center for Public Safety (NUCPS), and the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board (ILETSB).

- Eight Bartlett Police Department instructors were approved by ILETSB to instruct department members in-house and receive mandated training hours.
- Five in-house training courses were certified by ILETSB to meet required mandates established as a result of the Safe-T Act.

School of Police Staff and Command

In 2022, Sergeant Brian Camarata graduated from the Northwestern University Center for Public Safety's 10-week School of Police Staff and Command program, held in Schaumburg between September 12, 2022 – November 18, 2022. This intensive leadership and management education program helps prepare experienced law enforcement professionals for success in senior command positions. It has graduated over 14,500 students both nationally and internationally. The School of Police Staff and Command provides upper-level college instruction in a total of twenty-seven core or mandatory blocks of instruction and utilizes additional blocks of instruction during each session. The major topics of critical command-level content include planning and policies, media relations, organizational behavior, budgeting and resource allocation, human resources, contemporary policing, and more.

Crisis Intervention (CIT) Police Response

This past year, the Bartlett Police Department added five new officers to the Crisis Intervention Team. These officers attended a forty-hour training which educates officers on mental illness, along with other behavior disabilities. This intensive training provides officers with the skills and tools needed to safely and effectively deal with individuals who may be experiencing a mental health crisis, build officer awareness of these potential situations, and provide officers with the necessary tools and confidence to safely and effectively handle individuals experiencing a mental health crisis.

Crisis intervention not only provides confidence within our officers, but also helps to strengthen the bond between law enforcement and the community we serve. With mental health calls on the rise, officers are assigned to these crises almost on a daily basis. Officers recognize that families and acquaintances of individuals experiencing a mental health crisis may feel overwhelmed and stressed out.

In 2022, the Bartlett Police Department responded to:

- 82 mental health related calls for service. These calls for service ranged from individuals feeling suicidal, individuals with diagnosed or undiagnosed mental illnesses, to individuals suffering from a drug/ alcohol addiction.
- 437 domestic-related calls for service
- 13 drug and/ or alcohol related overdoses
- 0 suicides



988 Fast Facts

- 988 is confidential, free, and available 24/7/365, connecting those experiencing a mental health, substance use, or suicidal crisis with trained crisis counselors.
- Access is available through every land line, cell phone, and voice-over internet device in the United States and call services are available in Spanish, along with interpretation services in over 150 languages.
- The 988 dialing code is available for call, text, and chat starting on July 16, 2022. The previous 1-800-273-8255 number will continue to function even after the transition.
- The nationwide transition to 988 is just an initial step in reimagining crisis support in the U.S.

Police Social Worker Program

Through our social worker program, the Bartlett Police Department provides a liaison to assist the community with accessing the various assistance programs which members of the community may or may not be aware of. Successful interventions will pair citizens with the correct programs, which can help reduce the amount of future calls for service.

The Bartlett Police Department social worker program has now entered its second year of partnership with Northeast DuPage Family and Youth Services (NEDFYS) in 2022. Social Worker Misty Javan received 138 officer referrals throughout the year. In addition, she received 20 additional referrals from other departments within the village, walk-in requests for services, or phone call requests for services. These referrals ranged from mental health related incidents, drug use and abuse, domestic related incidents, to basic care service needs of less fortunate residents. Misty has been facilitating these referrals to meet our resident's unmet service needs. These services build positive trust within the community and build strong bonds between the police department and village residents.

In September 2022, came the addition of the juvenile tobacco and nicotine products diversion program. This program was implemented to target first-time offenses to offer an alternative to citations. The program is aimed at helping minors understand their use of nicotine and to help them choose healthy alternatives. The program hopes to redirect a minor's decision-making in a positive direction through education. Juvenile minors and their parents will voluntarily have to work with the program and successful completion will be a diversion in lieu of citation. Those minors eighteen through twenty years old will also have the option to attend the program instead of receiving a citation. The diversion hopes to reduce recidivism and any subsequent violations would not be eligible for the program. In 2022, one juvenile successfully completed the program.

Police Psychologist

Throughout this past year, Bartlett Police Department psychologist, Dr. Kammie Juzwin, continues to play an essential role for officers on dealing with officer wellness and mental health support. Dr. Juzwin often meets with officers in person or via ride-alongs, to discuss various topics to include the officer's well-being. With her expertise and experience, Dr. Juzwin is able to provide officers with the necessary tips to help manage and reduce the stressors that come with the job of a police officer. Dr. Juzwin also keeps up to date with various current required mandates relating to officer mental health and wellness, and completes roll call trainings for officers so they are equipped with current and updated information.

Dr. Juzwin also will assist in debriefing incidents with officers and will coordinate with the Northern Illinois Critical Incident Stress Management Team to bring them into the police department to assist with these debriefings as needed. This past year, Dr. Juzwin continues to contribute to the development of the emergency plan for support for officers and support for the community. This past year, Dr. Juzwin attained the status of Diplomate in

Traumatic Stress, through the American Academy of Experts in Traumatic Stress and Diplomate for the National Center for Crisis Management in collaboration with the American Academy of Experts in Traumatic Stress. Dr. Juzwin was featured in Northern Magazine's, Summer 2022 edition titled "The Workers of Well-Being."

Police Chaplain

The Bartlett Police Department Chaplain, Breanne Fuelling, is the Director of Counseling Ministries at the Village Church of Bartlett. Besides building relationships with department staff, she works to integrate services throughout the department and the community, and is one of the primary liaisons for the Bartlett Community Care Collective (BC3). Police Chaplains provide comfort and counseling to members of the police department and their families when they have been involved in a critically stressful situation, or if they seek counseling for personal reasons. Police Chaplains may also assist the public and provide comfort and guidance during stressful situations.





Facility Dog—Maverick

Maverick is a 2 1/2-year-old Golden Retriever which was donated by Canines 4 Comfort, a 501(c)(3) organization that provides local organizations with psychiatric service dogs and emotional support animals. Canines 4 Comfort graciously donated Maverick and training for his handlers. His food is donated by Nature's Select Pet Food. The program is supervised by a Facility Dog Coordinator and a Primary Handler. Maverick's functions include:

- Providing aid and comfort to persons, groups, and communities impacted by violence, tragedy, or traumatic events
- Assisting during investigations involving children or adults, to reduce their anxiety and increase communications
- Providing comfort for people during times of crisis
- Provide comfort to members of the department.

Maverick continued his training on a monthly basis throughout 2022. Maverick was deployed 34 times in 2022 and made appearances at each of the U-46 schools in Bartlett. He has attended community events such as Touch-a-Truck, National Night Out, and the Tree Lighting Ceremony, as well as many others. Maverick continues to boost the morale within the police department. During the daytime, he can be found breaking up his day with all department members. He occasionally goes home with a handler to enjoy relaxing weekends. When staying at the station overnight, he keeps the Records Section company and is loved by the cleaning crew.

Maverick and his handlers continue to train with other local comfort dogs. The purpose of the continued training is to gain a network should the need arise to have several dogs at a particular event. These contacts have proven to be beneficial when called upon. Maverick was deployed to Highland Park and Lombard after traumatic events and has been a part in the healing process for the communities and officers alike.

Vehicle Fleet

- SPACE (Side Protection and Cabin Enhancement) architecture
- Heavy duty front suspension, braking system, wheels, and tires
- Heavy duty subframe and powertrain mounts have been reinforced to handle the extreme stress and tension encountered on the job
- New technologies for officer safety like police perimeter alert to monitor an approximately 270-degree area around the vehicle
- BLIS (Blind Spot Information System) with cross traffic alert
- All-wheel drive and deep snow/sand traction control mode
- Hands-free Bluetooth

The police department received \$24,677.71 in federal, state, and organizational grants in 2022. Bartlett Police Department continues to pursue available grants to help fulfill our mission.



- The Bulletproof Vest Partnership Program from the U.S. Bureau of Justice Assistance reimbursed the Village of Bartlett \$2,950.80 in 2022 for the purchase of protective body armor for our officers. We were also approved for the next round of grant funding of \$11,152.50 for future body armor purchases. Body armor is replaced every five years for each officer and this grant reimburses half the cost of replacement.



Illinois Department of Transportation
Division of Traffic Safety

- \$18,976.91 was granted from the Illinois Department of Transportation Traffic Safety Division in 2022 for extra traffic enforcement in the areas of alcohol-related violations and safety belt enforcement. These traffic enforcement campaigns coincide with major holidays and are publicized to remind drivers not to drink and drive and to wear seat belts. The department has applied for the next round of IDOT traffic enforcement grants for FY2023-2024.



- Our Village's risk management agency, the Intergovernmental Risk Management Agency (IRMA), offers a series of grants to municipal members in areas that reduce risk and liability costs. The police department applied for and received an IRMA Fleet Safety Grant award in 2022 in the amount of \$2,750.00 to pay for adding safety reflective striping to the back of our squad cars.
